Superintendent's Message



The start of the school year can be filled with challenging tasks. It is a tribute to our staff, which works year-round to maintain more than 1 million square feet in our six school buildings on nearly 300 acres of our campuses. Our community entrusts us with maintaining these amazing facilities. In the hustle and bustle of a new school year, it can be easy to overlook some of the good news happening in our district. The following accomplishments are the product of the relationships built with our students, parents, staff, community stakeholders and partners. Without all of you, none of these would be possible.

NATIONAL MERIT HONORS

We are proud to recognize 11 Jackson High School students who have received National Merit Scholarship status.

The number of students who are taking the PSAT, which is a National Merit Scholarship qualifying test, has been on the rise. Two years ago, 90 students took the PSAT, and we had 226 take it last year. This year, 363 Jackson students registered for the October PSAT. For our students who wish to continue their academic studies in college, the National Merit Scholarship can be a route to help reduce college costs. Some universities offer significant college scholarships for National Merit Finalists and Semifinalists. Congratulations to all of our students for receiving these recognitions.

STATE REPORT CARD

The Ohio Department of Education & Workforce released data from the latest state report card and we are pleased to inform you our district received the highest rating possible, five stars. Jackson Local was one of just 68 districts in Ohio to receive a five-star rating and one of only three in Stark County.



Report Card data truly is a collaboration between parents, guardians, students, teachers, and staff. All six buildings put a tremendous amount of time and effort into analyzing our data and strategically planning to target areas of improvement. We are proud of our teachers working with our students to reach their potential.

ARTS PROGRAM WORKING HARD

Our students and staff in the Jackson School for the Arts are busy preparing and planning performances for this school year. Thank you to all who supported JSA by ordering chicken dinners last month.

Coming in November (Nov. 7, 9, and 10) is the fall musical *Mary Poppins*. You can find ticket information by following our JSA website at JSAJackson.org.

ATHLETICS

We are proud of our student-athletes who are competing this fall at a high level. It is a bit early to tell which teams may win league titles or postseason honors, but we have had a strong showing thus far. Our girls volleyball team is ranked No. 2 in Ohio, girls tennis won the Federal League, boys golf finished second in the Federal League, girls golf is right there as well, boys and girls soccer are playing well and both could win league titles, and our cross country teams (boys coming off a state title last season) are among the top three in the league.

The Jackson Local School District is thrilled to announce that eleven students have earned recognition in the prestigious National Merit Scholarship Program, marking one of the highest counts of honorees in a single year for the district. The remarkable students who have demonstrated exceptional academic achievement include semifinalists Isha Nagajothi, Noah Schrader, Eric Wasco, and Max Weber, and commended students Carter Bach, Stephen Hall, Evan Jordanides, Shakthi Prabhakaran, Matthew Sperling, Brooke Trayer, and Nate Weiler.

The National Merit Scholarship Program is one of the most competitive and well-known scholarship competitions in the United States. High school juniors are entered into the program by taking the Preliminary SAT/National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test (PSAT/NMSQT), which assesses critical reading, mathematics, and writing skills. Out of approximately 1.5 million test-takers nationwide, only around 50,000 high scorers are recognized. Of these, around 16,000 students are named semifinalists, representing less than 1% of high school seniors across the nation. The other 34,000 are recognized as commended students, a distinction that places them among the top academic performers in the country.

Semifinalists have the opportunity to compete for some 7,500 National Merit Scholarships worth nearly \$28 million that will be offered in the spring. To become finalists, these students must complete a detailed scholarship application, which includes writing an essay, demonstrating consistently high academic performance throughout high school, and submitting recommendations from a school official. Finalists will be notified in February, and scholarship winners will be announced beginning in April.

This recognition is a reflection of the hard work, dedication, and academic excellence of Jackson Local School District students. Superintendent Chris DiLoreto expressed his pride in the students, stating, "This achievement speaks to the quality of our students, teachers, and the support from our community. These students have set a standard of excellence that makes us all proud."

The eleven honorees represent a broad spectrum of interests and talents within the Jackson Local School District, and their achievements highlight the district's commitment to fostering academic excellence and preparing students for future success. The recognition they have received through the National Merit Scholarship Program is not only a testament to their personal effort and dedication but also an inspiration for all their peers.

Jackson Local School District congratulates these exceptional students for their hard work and dedication to their education. Their success is a source of pride for the entire district, and they set a tremendous example for all students in our community.

TONYA WRIGHT was appointed to the Board of Education in June 2020 and was elected to the Board in November 2021. She has a track record dedicated to servant leadership in Jackson and Stark County. 
The Board of Education meets monthly. Regularly scheduled meetings can be found on the district's website.

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Abby LaPole: Overcoming obstacles, reaching goals By Dan Mucci

On the surface, Abby LaPole is your typical teenager competing in multiple sports, prioritizing academics, and hanging out with friends. Abby likes to travel and make jewelry, has an engaging personality, and loves her dog, Charlie. Below the surface, the incredible young woman shows signs of continuing to blossom. For one, LaPole is an Ohio state champion in the seated position shot put. That is an amazing feat. But digging deeper, the feat is more astounding, considering that Abby competes athletically with a disability.



At birth, all seemed well for LaPole; however, after what appeared to be a normal birth, a blood clot formed in her left leg. Soon, the doctors needed to amputate her left leg up to her knee. Today, LaPole wears a prosthetic leg. LaPole's interest in sports started at age 3. She twirled the baton but discovered that it was not for her. Eventually, she found basketball, where she used to play at recess every day. Then, in 2019, Jackson Local Schools started wheelchair basketball through Adapted Sports of Ohio (ASO), which opened up a whole new athletic world for LaPole. Through that experience, she expanded her wheelchair basketball teams to the Jr. Wheelchair Cavaliers and the adult Lady Cavaliers - travel teams' part of the National

Wheelchair Basketball Association (NWBA). She also plays Sled Hockey for the Wooster Wildcats and throws a seated shotput. LaPole described some of the challenges she faces as an athlete, the least of which was finding teams to be a part of. She said Adapted Sports of Ohio started all these teams. "I have to have certain adaptive equipment, train differently, and find a way to play," said LaPole, who is the daughter of Chris and Jalyn. "I am lucky enough to have a school team that introduced the sports to me. Considering equipment, I can't just go onto the Nike site and buy a pair of ball shoes. I have to find a brand of sports chair to meet my needs. Some sports chair companies include Per4max, RGK, and Top End. These companies make custom chairs, fit to each player, so they are a lot more expensive than a pair of shoes. ASO started the interscholastic teams and provides chairs for the schools. I made a decision this past season to purchase my own custom chair, this is the path many other players around the country have to take. ASO is very generous in providing these pieces of equipment for us to borrow for the season. They do the same for track and field athletes. The equipment is one part of the challenge athletes with disabilities face. The other is training and building upper body strength. Coach Dickson (Jackson's Wheelchair Basketball Coach and her seated track coach) keeps me in shape in the weight room, and I also take the strength and conditioning class offered at the high school," said LaPole.

"Able-bodied basketball is a whole different game than wheelchair basketball. For example, jump shots aren't really possible in wheelchair basketball, so all the power to form a shot has to come from your arms and from what else you are able to control on your body. For seated shot-put, it is similar. Although, I don't need to work my legs as much as stand-up throwers. Since it is a different competition, I don't see the drive to be as good or better than them in their sport; I want to excel with other wheelchair athletes. With that being said, I respect the work any athlete puts into their life and their sport, no matter if it is adapted or not." As previously mentioned, basketball is her first love. She described her feelings about being on the basketball team. "When I first started, the one thing I noticed was kindness," said LaPole. "People on the court understand what others are going through or have gone through. And if they don't understand on a personal level, it is through kindness that you feel heard, seen, and understood. However, there is still TONS of competition! There is heat in the games, and they are an experience you don't really get to see often. And if you watch the Paralympics, which you should, you will see even more competition and heat, no matter the sport."



LaPole views herself as a model for younger basketball players. Jackson's wheelchair basketball team differs because teammates range from first-grade to seniors. "I do consider myself a role model for the younger players," said LaPole. "Younger athletes often cannot see the big picture. As athletes, we will always be different. But I remind them not to focus on what they can't do but rather on what they can do. I always try to encourage and provide positive reinforcement." This summer, LaPole attended two basketball camps, one in Texas and another at the University of Arizona. Her success has come in the seated shot put, but her heart and first love are basketball. Abby's mom, Jalyn, said, "Having the opportunity to participate in school-based athletic programs (the Wheelchair Basketball team and competing as part of the Track and Field team) gives our whole family a taste of the student-athlete experience. ADA is doing a great job of trying to grow these programs, but right now, the number of schools participating is still limited across the State. As more schools participate, the competition more closely mimics 'typical' school athletics, and that's exciting."

For any student/family that desires different sports options, wants to have additional competition opportunities (like Abby), or for anyone whose school hasn't yet

offered adapted programs, frequent travel is typically required. There are some amazing programs available, but most states only have a few locations, at best, that have established programs. We travel about an hour to and from all of Abby's non-school sports practices and out-of-state for the majority of her tournaments, competitions, and extra training. Coach Blake Dickson has made a huge difference in LaPole's athletic experience. "Having a coach that cares has made the basketball program better," said LaPole. "His passion and energy mean a lot." This past spring, LaPole won the Division I state seated championship. LaPole described the emotions she felt as a state champion. "I was extremely surprised," said LaPole, who will be a junior this year. "I could not believe it. I didn't throw my best, but it was enough."

LaPole edged out Federal League foe GlenOak's Elena Knowles. "It was awesome for our league to be represented this way," said LaPole. "Elena and I are friends and hang out sometimes. There is tough competition with Seated Shot-Put, and a lot of work goes into trying to improve." LaPole commented on how Jackson treats athletes with disabilities. The students and administration continue to make strides with room to grow as advocacy for disabled people increases. Each year, there is more inclusion. "There is always going to be room for growth and improvement," said LaPole. "However, each year, there is more and more support for the Wheelchair Basketball team, which is one way to show care toward disabled athletes. A word of advice: if someone is looking to make a change, just treat athletes with disabilities with respect and acknowledge their sport. It means a lot!"



Participating in sports, for any athlete, is tremendous for mental health. "Having the chance to be part of a team and the encouragement to continually challenge yourself is good for anyone," said Jalyn. "However, one of the best aspects of adaptive sports is the chance to meet other people with disabilities. There's no judgment or awkward questions. There's only acceptance, camaraderie, and usually, some intense competition!" Like all athletes, LaPole has dreams and goals. Her ultimate goal is to compete in the Paralympics one day in seated shot-put or basketball.



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

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
