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

Parents, Jackson Local Board of Education members, faculty, support

staff, honored guests, and – most importantly – our graduates: To the Class of 2025, it is my great privilege to congratulate you this evening on completing your high school career. Graduation is a milestone. It is a time to celebrate the accomplishments of your past and the promise of your future. Today, Class of 2025, we celebrate you.

For the past 13 years, the memories you have created in our classrooms, on the athletic fields, performing in the arts, rehearsing in band and choir rooms, socializing in cafeterias, and riding our school buses have prepared you for the journey ahead. Each experience has shaped you, teaching you valuable lessons and helping you understand what it means to achieve success.

Most recently, the Class of 2025 has helped us maintain our national standing among the best high schools in the *U.S. News & World Report* rankings.

In this graduating class, we have:

- FlameGuard, the Junior Achievement state, national, and international champions
- One student who scored a perfect 36 on the ACT and five others who scored a 35

- Four National Merit Finalists
- Ten students earning associate degrees

LIA JONES was elected to the board in 2021. She graduated from Denison University with a bachelor of arts degree in communication. She earned her Juris Doctor from the University of Akron School of Law. Jones is senior vice president and senior fiduciary strategist for the Akron, Canton, and Mahoning Valley region at KeyBank. In addition to her work on the JLSD Board of Education, Jones is a member of the Akron Symphony Board of Directors. 

Abbey & Katie: The Debevec Sisters By Dan Mucci

The Debevec sisters have a shared experience playing lacrosse for Jackson High School. At the center of the team's success has been senior Katie, who had the unique experience of playing with her older sister Chelsea and is now playing with her twin sister, Abbey.

When Chelsea was a senior at Jackson, three years ago, Katie played on varsity as a freshman. As her career has progressed as a Polar Bear, she has played with Abbey for the past few years. Katie and Abbey shared their thoughts on playing together.

"Every practice, game, team feed and bus ride with Abbey has been a blessing," wrote Katie, who enjoys running, hanging out with friends and playing pickleball. "Lacrosse has had a huge impact on us creating a bonding experience like no other."

Abbey echoed those sentiments. "It is an amazing experience that not many people can say they have (playing on the same team with your twin)," wrote Abbey, who enjoys hanging out with friends, playing pickleball and going on a walk/run in her spare time. "Being together, challenging each other and ultimately making each better not just physically but also mentally. It's super fun every day and the day the season ends, and we won't get the opportunity to play together again, that will be the hardest thing to say goodbye to."

However, Abbey shared that twin intuition and being together never gets old. "I never need a break from Katie," wrote Abbey. "We share the same friends, and we have since elementary school. We may argue because we are sisters, but five minutes later, we ae acting like it never happened. We are together 24/7 and when we are a part, it is the hardest thing. I came home from a volleyball tournament one time and Katie told me, 'never leave me again.' She's not only my sister but my

best friend and we rely on each other every day for support."

THE DEBEVEC SISTERS' LEGACY

Katie described what it was like to play with her sister Chelsea on the varsity team. "It was a pleasure



to play with my sister and learn from a great role model," wrote Katie, who is a member of Varsity J, student council and cheerleading at Jackson. "I've learned to focus on my own journey and not the comparisons to her though it can be tough living up to her achievements. I am so proud of all her success here at Jackson."

Abbey, like Katie, respects the groundwork laid by Chelsea, but she is looking to establish her own identity as well.

"I am beyond proud of both of my sisters for leaving such a legacy here at Jackson," wrote Abbey, who is a member of Varsity J, student council and volleyball at Jackson. "The challenge for me is to be myself rather than being compared to both of my sisters' success. I obviously want to represent my family's name well but there is no higher expectation than to represent Jackson as a team when we all have that jersey on."

PLAYING DIFFERENT POSITIONS

One area that does separate the twins on the field is Katie, a midfielder and Abbey is a defender.

Katie describes her role as midfielder, who will try out for cheering at Kent State University, where she will major in nursing. "I am listed as a midfielder/attacker because of taking the draw but primarily play attack. I relish the chance for creating offensive opportunities, making an impact on the game and executing plays with my team."

As a defender, Abbey's role is different. Abbey must use her voice to communicate with her teammates.

"Communication from the defensive side is crucial because we can give feedback to the attack to help them score more goals but also communicate with my teammates on defense to prevent teams from scoring on us," wrote Abbey, who will play volleyball at Kent State University and major in special education. "It is also a good way for us to be on the same page with midfielders as they are coming down to defense and need to know where to go. Being vocal builds trust within each of us and helps control the game.

"Being a defender is fun, but I have to stay super focused and always be ready to react to the other team's moves. What I really relish about the role is the chance to be a key part of the team. I love making those big defensive plays and shutting down an opponent's attack or driving attempt."

The Jackson girls' lacrosse team is successful year in and year out. With success comes pressure to uphold the school tradition. For the Debevec girls, practicing is a little easier with three players in the household.

"We love to get reps on the field together, even if it is just playing wall ball," wrote Katie, who started playing lacrosse at nine-years-old. "It is fun because we are all bonding and hanging out."

In every sport at Jackson, North Canton Hoover is their rival, lacrosse is no exception, where every year the Bears and Vikings battle for the top spot in the league.

"We are a close team, and we can count on one another to their part," wrote Abbey. "Our dynamic has grown so close, and we find the pressure of a successful program as a privilege to have played at

On the playing field, both girls indicated they are each other's biggest cheerleaders even if they play on opposite sides of the field. They are extremely

proud of each other's successes, and they build their confidence off of that.

The Debevec name is well known in Jackson, and not just because of the three girls' success on the lacrosse field. Their dad, Tim, is the Polar Bears head boys' basketball coach. But is he just a dad watching his kids play or does the coach in him come out?

COACHING A LACROSSE FAMILY


Kayla Miller, who is in her second year as head coach, has coached all three Debevec girls. "Yes, I had the incredible opportunity to coach Chelsea through summer travel lacrosse when she was going from eighth to ninth grade," said Miller. "Chelsea always played with such intensity and poise, but what stood out to me was that she played attack and told me she was happy to play low defense because she did not want to take away from the girls on the team and she was just there to help."

"It is amazing being able to coach Abbey and Katie together the past two years. It was a surprise to many when Abbey decided to come back and play, and I am so glad she did. They bring such a fun dynamic to the team where they know when to be goofy and lighten the mood, but then they also both know when it is ready to focus and get to work. Katie brings intensity, drive and offensive skills and IQ to our program while Abbey contributes vocal

leadership, communication and great sports mentality that rubs off on the rest of the girls." Being a coach and having the kids of a coach on the team could be challenging, but Miller is handing it in stride and sees both sides of the Debevec family.

"Coach Debevec has been one of the biggest supporters of the lacrosse program from both a parent and coaching perspective," wrote Miller. "He is well known and respected in the community. He has built such a strong basketball program. I know that if I ever needed any sort of coaching advice that I can ask him, and he will do his best to help. Because he is a coach, he knows what it is like to be in my shoes, so he is there if I need coaching help, or he is there just to be a supportive parent to do anything behind the scenes to support the girls. Coach and his wife Chris have been amazing, and I will definitely miss having a Debevec daughter on the lacrosse turf, but I am so grateful for the time I did have to coach them all.

And the girls added their two cents to the topic as well. "The best part of our dad is he is a parent first," said Katie and Abbey. "He will always be there at the end of our game to give us a hug and tell us he is proud of us whether we win or lose. We are beyond grateful to have our dad be a coach and so proud of him every day. When he is not on the court, he's an even better dad than he is coach."

Jackson Local seeks to serve students with disabilities



Within the intent of the federal statutes (Rehabilitation Act of 1973-section 504 and Individuals with Disabilities Education Act IDEA-public law 105-17), the Jackson Local School District continues its effort to locate and identify children with disabilities from birth through age 21. Children with disabilities have physical, emotional, and/or mental impairments that may require special education. Public schools provide free and appropriate education regardless of a child's disability. However, before these children can be served, they must be found. Many of these children are not visible because

they may not function in the community's mainstream, and many are preschoolers. Parents may not realize that programs and services are available through their school district or from agencies in their community.

A Quarterback and his Coach look forward to next season By Dan Mucci

It is always football season in Stark County. Warmer days and longer nights are signaling summer is here, but high school football coaches and players are working on spring/summer practices to prepare for the start of two-a-days in August.

This year, the Polar Bears offense is looking for a reset. Under the direction of second year offense coordinator Badre Bardawil and the return of quarterback Lucas Ecrement, who is fully recovered from knee surgery, Jackson is looking to be a powerhouse on the offensive side of the field.

Lucas, the son of Randy Ecrement and Jill Schoonover, injured his knee at the end of his sophomore season on a play in the red zone against rival North Canton Hoover.

Bardawil, who graduated from St. Thomas Aquinas High School and later coached at his alma mater, described what he is looking for with this year's offense.

"I came in last season and implemented some new things into the offense while keeping a lot of core concepts and principles from the previous season," wrote Bardawil, who graduated from Kent State University. "Lucas came back last year from knee surgery and worked extremely hard to get himself ready to play. He was able to compete in a normal off-season this year and he has taken full advantage. He has put on 20 pounds and regained a lot of the speed he showcased as a sophomore.

My expectations for him are extremely high. He needs to build on all the experience he has gained over the last three seasons and put together a special senior season. I'm excited to watch him play at full strength."



Lucas Ecrement scrambling for positive yardage

Ecrement described how tough last season was for him to sit out last season... "It was tough, especially not being able to play with the seniors one last time," wrote Ecrement, who has a sister, McKenzie. "My rehab is over and I'm finally back at 100%. One way I stayed involved with the team last season was coming to the liftings even if I could not participate."

Bardawil described Ecrement's style of play: "As a freshman/sophomore, he was definitely a dual threat showing speed that made him a difference-maker when he ran the ball," wrote the purple and white's play caller, who is married to Megan. They have a daughter, Maya, and son, Rocco. "Coming off his knee injury, he molded himself into more of a pocket passer expanding his football IQ and showing confidence sitting in the pocket and having a good understanding of what he's reading and how to get the ball out versus pressure. I think he's ready now to put all that together and be a true dual-threat QB."

Ecrement is looking forward to returning to the field. He believes he aligns with what his coach is implementing.

"(I feel like) me and coach think very alike in terms of the offense," wrote Ecrement, who also plays baseball at Jackson, is involved in student council, and enjoys hanging out with family and friends in his spare time.

The coach described Lucas's strengths and areas to grow.

"Lucas's strengths are his toughness, coachability and poise," wrote Bardawil. "This kid has shown his ability to perform at a high level while taking big hits and playing through injuries. He never wants to take plays or reps off no matter how hurt he may be.

"He is also a great listener. He is open to coaching every day and wants to get better with every rep. He handles criticism well and always just plays the next play. He is fun to coach everyday even though he is not much of a talker. Plus, the moment doesn't get too big for him. He plays with a calmness and poise that is required in high pressure situations."

Ecrement describes what he feels are his strengths on the field.

"My strengths of being a quarterback I feel is knowing and trusting every single person on and off the field," he wrote.

A concern is Ecrement needs to keep building his body and continue to get stronger in the weight room, which Ecrement agreed to as well. Ecrement also feels he needs to polish his foot

"It is extremely important because we have four new starters on the offensive line and we must replace an All-Ohio running back and two veteran wide receivers who had a lot

of production," wrote Bardawil.


Ecrement is looking to make a strong statement this year. And that starts with the relationship he has with his teammates.
