In addition, our summer staff works four 10-hour days, enabling us to power down three days each week. Our energy program is a way to conserve dollars as well as an opportunity to demonstrate environmental leadership to students, staff, and the community.

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
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Students welcome Senior

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

Lora Finn Battelle Award

Amherst 4th grade teacher, Lora Finn, was one of 45 Ohio teachers to receive the Battelle for Kids "Celebrate Teaching Award" for distinguished educators.

The criteria used to select Mrs. Finn included principal feedback and data showing that she consistently achieved above expected growth with her students over the last two years.

In a letter to Mrs. Finn, Jim Mahoney, Executive Director, Battelle for Kids stated, "Your work provides compelling evidence of your ability to impact students year after year."

In June, Mrs. Finn will join other distinguished educators at the annual Celebrate Teaching conference in Columbus to receive her award.

I am very proud of all of my students and all of their hard work, and I am very grateful to be able to teach in such an amazing school district with a plethora of talented and dedicated educators," said Mrs. Finn.

Stefanie Fatzinger Jackson's Teacher of the Year

Mrs. Fatzinger is a one-person Theatre Department as International Baccalaureate (IB) teacher of theatre and dance at JHS. She has taught grades 9-12

and has increased the level of complexity of the theatre productions to the likes of Shakespeare and Molière.

Her students learn set design and construction, using all the tools of the trade, stage makeup, costume design (sewing many costumes herself), production, and acting.

Mrs. Fatzinger has endless energy. She arrives early in the morning, teaching a 0 period IB Theatre class before the regular school day begins and remains long after the school day ends. Since none of the theatre productions occurs during the school day, Mrs. Fatzinger spends many afternoons and weekends in rehearsal, making sure that each of her students succeed.

A master at finding the right niche for her students, they shine on stage and behind the scenes. She helps her students discover who they are, find a talent they may not have known they had, and develop the confidence to follow their aspirations.

Rui Tan Jackson's Rookie Teacher of the Year

Miss Tan took on an enormous teaching load during her first year as Chinese language teacher and has handled it with great success, always focusing on how she can best serve her

students. She teaches Chinese I, II, III, IV, and AP. During this first year, she has had to learn about the AP curriculum framework and submit a syllabus to the AP Audit site, which was approved quickly. Now add: intense training and meetings for the newly formed Jackson Academy of Global Studies, workshops for teaching her upcoming International Baccalaureate Chinese course, involvement in the Ohio Chinese Language Teachers' Association, advising Chinese Club, writing course organizers for all levels of Chinese, and monthly meetings to teach Chinese to students making a summer trip to our sister school in Jiaozhou, Shandong Province, China.

Miss Tan has earned the admiration of her students. One of her students invited her to the Top 25 Banquet where she was honored for her contributions to his success in Chinese. She has a truly caring way about her that is a beacon to her students who enjoy learning from "Tan Laoshi," as they respectfully address her.

Recommendations for Teacher of the Year and Rookie Teacher of the Year are made by principals to a county board who makes the final selections.

Stark County Student Councils meet at JHS

Periodically throughout the school year, student councils from Stark County high schools meet to share ideas and raise funds for a charity of choice. The spring meeting was held at Jackson, and the respective schools collected \$397.47 for Project K.A.R.E.

Attending this meeting were 31 representatives from McKinley, Minerva, Canton City, Sandy Valley, and of course, Jackson. A keynote speech on leadership was given by Jackson Local Superintendent Chris DiLoreto who involved the students in an active discussion on the qualities of great leaders. The group later toured the high school, lunched together, attended three break-out sessions, and heard a presentation by JHS Principal Monica Myers who holds a monthly meeting with JHS student leaders to discuss topics



as varied as codes of conduct, bullying, dress code, classroom temperature, and more. She spoke on how the administration and Student Leadership Group work together to understand

one another in order to enhance the high school experience. Mrs. Myers recommended that students introduce themselves to the administrators in their own schools.














Student battles bombs with books

Nicole Lawson, a JMMS sixth grader, had too many books. Her bookshelf was overflowing. 'Some of these books must go,' she said to herself. She wondered if her friends at school also had books they had outgrown. If they did, she would take them. She would send them to other children who had too few books. And so, the project, "Books That Go" was born. To Nicole's surprise and delight, 6,000 books landed in her family's garage. Nicole sent the books to multiple children's agencies in the U.S. and Ecuador, with some help from The Canton chapter of the Foundation for Community Betterment.

Nicole's idea came to her amid the Boston bombing as she saw so much grieving.

"Bad things happen, and you can't undo them, but you can make a positive impact in the present," Nicole said. "Little things matter, and even if you're young, you can make a difference."

"She motivates me to be a better person," said Nicole's mother, Kelly.








Exceptional Olympics send-off

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Jackson seeks to serve children with disabilities

Within the intent of the federal statutes (Rehabilitation Act of 1973-section 504 and Individuals with Disabilities Education Act IDEA-public law 105-17), the Jackson Local School District continues its effort to locate and identify children with disabilities from birth through age 21. Children with disabilities have physical, emotional, and or mental impairments that may require special education. Public schools provide free and appropriate education regardless of a child's disability. However, before these children can be served, they must be found. Many of these children are not visible because they may not function in the community's mainstream, and many are preschoolers. Parents may not realize that programs and services are available through their school district or from agencies in their community. If you are aware of a child who may need a special education program or services, contact the principal of the school the child attends or would likely attend upon reaching school age.

Jackson seeks federal grants for special education

The Jackson Local School District is eligible to submit two applications to the Ohio Department of Education for federal grants to maintain and improve special education programs and services in the Jackson Local Schools: Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA) (Public Law 105-17) and Education of the Handicapped Act, Preschool Grant Program (Public Law 99-457). Residents within the Jackson Local School District may inquire and make program and service recommendations regarding the grant applications. The standards require a practical, real-life

application of knowledge that prepares students for success in college, work and

Just before the close of the school year, the Sauder students spent five weeks translating what they learned into easy-to-understand fifth grader language. They wrote chapters on topics such as relative place value, long division, fractions, volume, rounding, and long multiplication. For each topic, the students show sample problems, stepby-step instructions, Web sites for further study and a way that a fifth grader might

use the information in the real world.

"The state's wording was not so good, so we had to translate it into something kids would understand," said student Shreyaa Nagajothi.

Mr. Blackstock beamed when he heard his student, Divya Patibandla, say, "This project made us smarter. Mr. Blackstock says the ultimate proof that you know something is being able to teach it to somebody."

"They will know what is expected of them," added Victor Scott.

The overall head-to-head record of all sports combined was 243 wins, 97 losses and 7 ties for a winning percentage of 72%. The overall Federal League head to head record was 109-44-2 for a 71% winning percentage. Polar Bear teams combined for 7 Federal League championships, had 8 of their teams reach regional play, had 6 teams place at the state level

competition, including one state runner-up and one third place finish. The Bears won the Federal League All-Sports Trophy for the second consecutive year, accumulating 123½ points to outscore second place Hoover by 4 points.



GIRLS LACROSSE

All League performers were: Micah Johnson in the 400, Tyler Berg in the 800, the 4 x 400 relay team of Johnson, Berg, Joey Boord, and Josh Reed, and the 4 x 800 team of Johnson, Berg, Reed and Ben Hyde. The 4 x 800 team also advanced to the State Tournament, which has not been run as of this writing.

BOYS TENNIS

The Boys' Tennis Team, coached by Lee Fortner, finished the season with a 13-4 overall record and a perfect 6-0 in the Federal League. They captured the Federal League Tournament title, giving the Bears the overall Federal League title. Freshmen sensations Joey Thomas and Jake Zalenski were named to the All-League First Team in singles. Senior, Ben Shaheen paired with sophomore Mark Dickerhoof to grab All-League First-Team honors in doubles. Thomas was the Federal League Player of the Year and qualified to the Division 1 State Singles Tournament. Coach Fortner was named the League's Coach of the Year.

Andrew Stalnaker Walsh University Baseball Scholarship






Lacrosse ladies crosse check poverty


