

District receives Energy Star Award

Jackson Local School District. serving more than 5,800 students under more than 1,032,000 square feet of roof, has been recognized by the EPA as a Top Performer, achieving an average Energy Star performance score of 97 district-wide (where a score of 75-100 is

needed). Furthermore, each of our buildings has earned Energy Star Certification.

To spearhead the program in 2011, Superintendent Chris DiLoreto challenged each building to achieve a 25% improvement in energy performance compared to a 2009 baseline. Staff and students rose to the challenge, and the district has experienced a cost savings of 27%, which equates to approximately \$418,000 per year, with a savings of \$626,272 to date.

> The district will reinvest its savings by modifying lighting controls, sealing building envelopes, modifying ductwork, purchasing Energy Star-gualified office equipment, and improving its building management system by upgrading the interface.

The district has prevented the emissions of more than 3.589 metric tons of carbon dioxide, which compares to 644 cars not driven for 1 year and the carbon sequestered by more than 91,800 tree seedlings planted and grown for over 10 years.

JHS AMONG TOP 100 HIGH SCHOOLS IN OH

Jackson was named among the top 100 public high schools in Ohio, according to the 2012 rankings by U.S. News & World Report.

Hoover and Louisville were also named, although Jackson was ranked the top area school, coming in at number 24 in the state and 647 nationally.

To produce the 2012 rankings, U.S. News teamed up with the American Institutes for Research, one of the largest behavioral and social science research organizations in the world.

The methodology is based on the key principles that a great high school must serve all of its students well, not just those who are college-bound, and that it must be able to produce measurable academic outcomes to show the school is successfully educating its student body across a range of performance indicators.

US. News examines state proficiency standards, how well students are prepared for college and several other factors to compute its rankings.

The team analyzed more than 21,000 public high schools in 49 states and Washington, D.C. (Nebraska did not have enough data to be included.)



A child's view of the Holocaust

Nelly Toll was six-years-old in Lwow, Poland when she and her mother spent two years hiding from the Nazis in a bedroom of a Christian family. The family had bricked over an outside window and placed a decorative rug over the interior opening. When anyone came to the apartment, Nelly and her mother hid on the window ledge behind the rug. Nelly created a diary of her fearful experiences and 64 watercolor paintings that surprisingly illustrate her fantasy world in which there is happiness and hope. Dr. Toll spoke with JSA students about her wartime experiences and showed her artwork. She asked students to "never persecute" (as a bully) and to take a stand against injustice. Students gave her a standing ovation.

Dr. Toll's paintings have been shown around the world, and eight are in the permanent collection of the Yad Vashem Museum in Israel. Her book, *Behind the Secret Window*, is available online.



AIDDLE SCHOOI Stamping out suffering, one shoe at a time

While watching a Soles4Souls video with her family, JMMS 8th grader Sarah Wright saw children attending school barefooted and was inspired to offer others the health benefits and simple joy a pair of shoes can bring.

Soles4Souls collects new and gently worn shoes to give to victims of abject suffering.

"We all have so many shoes, and some people have none," Sarah said.

In 2011, US citizens threw away over 300 million pairs of shoes while 300 million children live their lives without ever owning a single pair.

Sarah spread the word of her two-week shoe campaign through morning announcements, posters and a contest to see which homeroom could collect the most shoes. The response was so great that Sarah quickly needed to recruit fellow students to help her collect the donated shoes. She and her committee counted, rubber banded, and boxed over 600 pairs of shoes. It took both of her parents' SUVs to deliver the shoes to a warehouse in Medina, Ohio where they would be shipped to Soles4Souls along with thousands of other shoes, collected by the National Association of Professional Organizers.

Through this experience, Sarah became sharply

aware of the poverty in various geographical areas; learned leadership, marketing and recruiting skills; and most importantly, she said, "I learned that one person can make a difference in the world, one pair at a time."

Two Tall Crazy Ladies encourage JMMS test takers

JMMS was all-abuzz when the two tall crazy ladies from Cincinnati showed up to sign autographs and wish students well on the Ohio Achievement Test. You'd have thought Justin Bieber had hit the scene. These women are absolutely famous in our district because their test-taking strategy has increased our students' skill and confidence and the stories about their basketball skills and Guinness World Record have thrilled the young learners. Pat and Pam Terry of Twin Towers Training became legend at JMMS five years ago, after Jackson's Director of Special Programs, Kathy Brand, introduced one of their test-taking techniques to JMMS students and lovingly christened it the Two Tall Crazy Ladies Strategy for multiple-choice questions. Such questions are not as easy to answer as they were in the past. JMMS students have learned that when taking a multiple-choice test, two of the four or five options are always clearly wrong. Of the remaining answers, one or two are almost right and one is perfectly right. As a result of our students' success with the strategy, the two, tall, crazy ladies have become heroes in our district. Posters of the tall twins, with tiny Mrs. Brand between them, grace many of the classrooms to remind students of the technique and to make them smile.

When the Guinness record-holding worlds tallest twins arrived at JMMS, they signed autographs for nearly two hours as approximately 500 students presented past test papers to be signed. The excited students made comments such as, "I'm so going to frame this," and "This is the best day of my life." Teachers were just as excited, asking the twins to step into class photos and making comments such as, "I feel like a groupie," and "They rock."

The twins had business in the Akron area and took time to visit with our students at no charge to the district. "It is an honor and a privilege to be here," said Pam. "We are very humbled," added Pat. Both women wore the badge of "crazy" proudly, "Because we ARE crazy," they said nearly in unison. 
Jackson grad knows you can grow what you eat \parallel Jackson grads receive OSU honors

Brad Halm, a 1998 JHS grad, a Denison University grad, and current resident of Seattle, Washington, has co-authored a book (with business partner Colin McCrate), Food Grown Right, In Your Backyard, a guide to growing edible crops at home. Brad believes anyone can grow food. It doesn't matter whether you have a lot of land or a few containers.

"Our goal with the book is to clearly guide a newcomer to organic food gardening through every step of the process, from choosing the best site and design for the garden to building and watering it, to the cultural care of individual crops," Brad said.

Inspired by many of the farming guides they'd read, Brad and Colin wanted to add to the body of knowledge for people growing food in urban areas and suburban yards. The book is straightforward enough for a beginning gardener and a valuable resource for the experienced gardener. It relies heavily on photos to illustrate the principles.

Brad and Colin own and operate the Seattle Urban Farm Company. They specialize in edible garden design, installation, and maintenance for residents, schools, restaurants, and other businesses in the Puget Sound area. Early on, the majority of their work was building gardens for individuals and families. Recently, they've



expanded into production farming on restaurant rooftops and setting up educational gardens for local schools.

"Our work has been very rewarding, as we get to see people making a tangible connection to the food they eat on a daily basis. I think there's a lot of joy involved in eating food that you've grown yourself, and it really gives you an appreciation and awareness of everything else that you eat," Brad said.





Jackson wins Federal League All Sports Trophy

"This is the first time since 2007-08 that the Polar Bears have won the Federal League All Sports Trophy," said a pleased Terry Peterson, Jackson's athletic director. But it did not come as a surprise to him as this was one of the most successful athletic season in the school's history, with 11 of the 21 teams winning Federal League championships.

The title was nearly cinched in the fall with seven of the nine teams winning Federal League titles and a 2nd place finish for girls cross country. This gave the Bears 63 All Sports Trophy points, an 18.5 lead over their closest competitor, Hoover who came in at 44.5. The two schools have dominated the trophy since its inception in the 1980s. Hoover held the title for the past three years, although Jackson was on top for much of the 90s through 2006-07.

As winter sports ended, the Bears were still ahead, logging three more championships, then finishing the job this spring with a boys track championship, a 2nd place finish in baseball and a fine showing by the remaining teams.
