

# Senior memory making



# JMMS student signatures to blast off into outer space

Throughout May, JMMS students joined 500 schools around the world by signing Student Signatures in Space® posters to celebrate Space Day 2009 on May 1.

The program, jointly sponsored by NASA and Lockheed Martin, provides elementary and middle school students the opportunity to send their digitized signatures into space and feel a personal involvement with the crew and the mission.

The Space Shuttle mission designated to carry this year's signatures has tentatively been identified as STS-129, a flight to the International Space Station that is scheduled for November.

After the signatures return from space, the poster will be returned for permanent display along with a flight certificate and picture of the crew that carried the signatures into space.

Since the program began in 1997, over 5.5 million students have participated in Student Signatures in Space, including Strausser Elementary. There is no cost to schools to participate.

# JMMS students explore and celebrate the fabric of our culture

Jackson School for the Arts (JSA) collaborated with 6th graders in the implementation the first year of a SmARTS grant from ArtsinStark that affords Jackson \$30,000 over three years. The goal of the grant is to integrate the arts into the history and language arts programs with the expectation that the arts will improve student learning.

The year's theme was "Fabric of Our Culture," which had students in the freshman JSA program and the JMMS 6B community literally and metaphorically exploring fabric and its influence on themselves and various cultures. Both 6th graders and JSA students visited the Itchiku Kubota Kimono show at the Canton Museum of Art and experimented with Kubota's labor-intensive shibori technique (a dying process similar to tie-dying). Sixth graders learned to write their names in Chinese with assistance from our quest Chinese teacher, Mr. Ren, and created calligraphy symbols that related to their personal narratives.

They also made fabric quilts depicting something about themselves. Finally, they created hand-bound books with assistance from visual artist in residence Kathy Jevec.

This year, the grant enriched approximately 200 JSA freshmen and 6th graders. Next year, the program will expand to include all JSA students grades 9-12 and all 6th graders (nearly 600 students).

Next year's theme, "The Magic of Fabric" will expand the usual idea of fabric by focusing on the Jackson community. Students will explore what is magical about the fabric of Jackson Township.

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#### **Young authors ce** ate the power of words on paper

Approximately 200 JMMS 6th graders wrote and published hard-back books, some about the students' personal experiences and others fictional survival stories based upon the students' research into remote places on the earth. The goal of the project was to enable students to experience the thrills and challenges of publishing their ideas for others to enjoy. In the process, the students studied characterization, setting, and the structure of story plots. They incorporated dialogue,



figurative language, and sensory details to bring their stories to life. Topics ranged from haunted house experiences and childhood injuries, to the Holocaust. An authors' reception, held in the school library, was attended by more than 100 guests. Over 400 students also visited the reception, where the student authors read their stories and celebrated their work.

## Jackson Local staffer spends spring break helping victims of Katrina



# They went nuts at the Netz

In April, the Jackson Local Board of Education named the stadium at Jackson High School in honor of a beloved coach who has faithfully served the school district for more than three decades.

The 2009 season marked Coach Rick Netzelt's 35th year as a head coach. He has provided the leadership and motivation which has resulted in 16 Federal League Championships and nine District Championships.

Coach Neitz, as he is lovingly referred to as, has been recognized by his peers as Federal League Coach of the Year eleven times and as Stark County Coach of the year 11 times and has impacted the lives of approximately 2,200 athletes.

The School Board commendation declared, "Rick Neitzelt has displayed an unwavering work ethic and loyalty to the Jackson Local School District and has set a high standard for all. He has been an outstanding role model for our student athletes displaying the highest standards of character, ethics, integrity and sportsmanship."

For those reasons, the stadium at Jackson High School is now known as the RICK NEITZELT STADIUM. That is the name on the scoreboard, but those who know and love the man already call the stadium THE NETZ.

"I was totally taken by surprise and extremely humbled by it," Coach Netz said, adding that he just loved what he did and his accomplishments paled in comparison to student growth. What excited him about his career was "Watching the kids grow from year-to-year and watching their growing confidence. Whether they are a top athlete or a hard worker with less natural talent, when they got excited about shaving a few seconds off their time, or improving in any way, then I got excited with them." Coach Netz said.

"It was a great experience, and I learned it from the best music teacher, Mrs. Grove," said Makayla Zawacky who played the part of Nancy.



A teacher retiring from Jackson, after 30 years of service, has likely taught over 32,000 lessons, spent about 2,700 hours grading papers after school, and touched the lives of 750 children (elementary teachers) to 3,750 children (middle school or high school teachers).

# Sauder Elementary New teacher wags her way into students' hearts

Misty, a two-year-old weimaraner, motivated a classroom of Sauder students to improve their communication skills. Every Thursday, Misty and her owner/trainer, Julia Etter, visited Sherri Reynolds's kindergarten through 2nd grade students to aid their learning despite their various disabilities.

Mrs. Reynolds explained that sometimes a disability such as autism leaves a child unmotivated to speak. But when Misty visits, the students eagerly interact, sometimes using sign language. Misty responds to sign language. Student George Tully gave Misty the sign for "lie down" and was delighted to see Misty follow the command. Other sign and

verbal commands, such as sit, stay, and come, bring equal delight as Misty does exactly what the children ask of her.

"Students are learning the power

of communication by giving Misty a command and getting an immediate payoff. Using language makes something happen," Mrs. Reynolds said.

It took 100 parent volunteers led by Dawn Stark and Denise Brine to hold an PTG end-of-year fun-fest that transformed the school yard into a childhood wonderland filled with over a dozen games, inflatables, and sweet treats.

# Poetry Cafe

Sauder first graders in Mrs. Rae Russell's class developed an appreciation of poetry as they recited (usually from memory) a poem a week to their classmates. Students kept poetry notebooks containing their chosen pieces and selected from that notebook as they hosted their Poetry Cafe for parents at the end of the school year. Parents brought muffins and juice while students brought poems and props for an afternoon of meter and verse.

Speech therapist Susan Marchi said, "The sign language makes Misty a perfect fit for this class," adding that the work being

accomplished with Misty is also raising the students' motivation to speak to people.

"Misty is more Serena Hamilton motivating than I am," said a humbled but

happy Mrs. Reynolds.

The children also improved their reading skills by playing language games with Misty and by reading directly to her. Misty sits beside a reader and watches, never judging, never correcting, only motivating the young readers to keep at it.

Mrs. Etter is thrilled to be a part of student progress. She said she loves well-behaved dogs, owns a well behaved dog, and I saw a unique way to serve her community. But Misty is not just a well-behaved dog. She is a certified therapy dog who had to pass all 11 tests administered by Therapy Dogs International. Misty also complies with the stringent Jarod's Law now in effect in Ohio schools.

Adam Parramore's mother, Lisa, called the program phenomenal. "Mrs. Reynolds sent home pictures of our children every week, and as the weeks went on, it was like watching a storybook of confidence unfold," she said.

Jennifer Philabaum, a speech therapy student teacher, commented that well-trained dogs like Misty want to work and want to give their unique gifts.

"And they ask nothing in return," said Mrs. Etter.

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

"Well done Master Pelton," his students proclaimed.



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
# **Stark Strikers** bowl and belong


#### Young Equestrians
