I hope you were able to attend our Unity in the Community Pancake Breakfast and Health Fair last month. For the past six years, this outstanding event has brought all age groups in our community together for a morning of visiting with one another, learning about health trends, and the pure enjoyment of a stack of pancakes with a side of sausage.

This year's breakfast was bigger and better than ever. We served about 7,500 pancakes to approximately 2,500 guests. Our cafeteria ladies began mixing batter the evening before the event and arrived at 5 AM on breakfast day to begin flipping the flapjacks and sizzling the sausage. Many volunteers from our staff and the community volunteered countless hours.

I want to offer a special note of thanks to three women who are instrumental in making this event a yearly success. They are Susie Gindlesberger, Jennifer Herold, and Janelle Winkhart.

Their original vision was to simply bring the community together for a morning of unity. These three ladies, with their enthusiasm and hard work, have inspired 500 students, staff and community volunteers to roll up their sleeves and take part in this event.

The breakfast raises some funds, which are channeled right back to our students in the form of scholarships and essentials for students in need. All 6 Jackson cafeterias win Food Excellence Award

The Stark County Health Department has awarded all six of our school cafeterias the Grade A Food Excellence Award for the highest level of commitment to food safety and sanitation. This award not only requires a track record of good sanitation, but also emphasizes the ability of the operation to educate its employees in food safety.

"The cafeteria staff at Jackson Local has demonstrated superior knowledge of food safety regulations. Thank you for taking food safety and sanitation to an excellent level," wrote Health Commissioner Kirkland K. Norris to Jackson Local's Food service Director, Marsha Escola.

"I am proud of our food service staff for their dedication to creating a safe and enjoyable experience for the children. I believe parents would expect no less from their top-rated school system," said Mrs. Escola. "We really guard our children, paying strict attention to cleanliness, food temperatures and preparation standards. We also work to keep lunch prices low and food quality high, constantly trying new items with reduced fats and adding more whole grains and more fresh fruits and vegetables."

The Food Service Department now serves double the amount of fresh, whole foods than it did just two years ago. This is a challenge, as fresh and whole costs more than canned and boxed, but it provides important nutrients for our students.



Nationally traveled Jackson Band about to become international sensation

Jackson's Marching Polar Bears have accepted a very special invitation to perform for their sister school in China. The students will travel to Beijing and Jiaozhou, China over spring break in March of 2014.

In 2010, leaders from Jiaozhou No. 1 High School in Qingdao, China came to America to visit JHS. During the visit, the administrators from Jiaozhou were incredibly impressed with the Jackson Band Program. Because of the superior quality of the musicians in the Jackson High School Bands, the program received an official invitation from the leaders in Qingdao to experience an unprecedented opportunity for global education and performance in China.

The nationwide pool of 16,000 semifinalists—representing less than one percent of U.S. high school seniors—includes the highest-scoring entrants in each state.

Jackson Local has consistently clean audits. It takes a team of six state auditors over 600 hours to review our books. That's six sets of eyes making sure your funds are properly handled.

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


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Welcome to the Middle School

Peace takes flight at JMMS

Annually, on September 21, Peace Day is observed around the world with special activities, festivals, concerts, moments of silence at noon in every time zone, and much more. Jackson Memorial Middle School students joined the peace wave this year by creating a piece of public art for their school. Art teacher, Lisa Ayres Surber, provided a variety of paper butterflies for students to color. She then applied hundreds of them to a large, wooden peace symbol in the style of artist David Kracov. The finished piece is displayed prominently at the school.

"This project brought together all ages of students, families and teachers to promote peace in our school and community through a collaborative art installation. We hope this work serves as a daily reminder to consider peace in all we do," said Mrs. Surber.

In 1981, the United Nations General Assembly, by unanimous vote, established the International Day of Peace, "...to devote a specific time to concentrate the efforts of the whole of mankind to promoting the ideals of peace and to giving positive evidence of commitment to peace in all viable ways." The first Peace Day was celebrated in September 1982.

Lake Cable Elementary Dave Maurer






Alumni take the field again

JHS teacher is best selling textbook author



Parthena Draggett is not only a JHS Spanish and French teacher, the head of our World Languages Department, a college board consultant, and a National Board Certified teacher, but is also a best-selling textbook author. Her book, titled TEMAS, is currently the number one best-selling Spanish textbook in the U.S. The book is intended for high school advanced placement students, offering them a comprehensive, contemporary experience of the Spanish language, centered around six internationally recognized themes.

Mrs. Draggett served as lead author in association with Cole Conlin, Max Ehrsam, and Elizabeth Millan, all with impressive credentials in the field.

Although Mrs. Draggett receives no

royalties for her work, the publisher, Vista Higher Learning, has provided Jackson Local Schools with 45 copies of the book and six years of access to the book's extensive online components. Her students are thrilled to be studying from a book authored by their teacher.

AP students take a proficiency test that is ranked with scores from 1-5. Through Mrs. Dragget's efforts to complete the text, last year's students benefited from her research and Jackson AP scores rose significantly.

"I think I became a better teacher in the process of writing this book," Mrs. Draggett said, "and I love it that I am not only offering our students a chance at better outcomes but also offering the same to students all over the world."

Wags 4 Warriors saves lives

JHS student groups, Community Matters, FACES, and Interact Club are making and selling all-natural dog treats to benefit Wags4Warriors, a group that provides therapy dogs for soldiers who are suffering from traumatic brain injury or PTSD. The goal is to raise \$3000 to save one dog and one veteran of the Iraq/Afghanistan wars. The funds pay for 220 hours of dog and veteran training. Nearly 70% of the dogs are rescues. Would you know if your child was involved in risky business?

Jackson High School will host an interactive awareness program for parents and other adults about risky behaviors that young people may be engaging in. The program, **Hidden in Plain Sight**, includes a simulated bedroom that adults can walk through to try and pick out over 150

items which may indicate risky youth behavior. Copley and Bath Township Police, assisted by Jackson Township Police, will present this astonishing information. There will be a PowerPoint presentation followed by an open forum to ask questions. The topics of this presentation include substance abuse,

violence, eating disorders, juvenile crime, technology, risky games, and more. The program will be held January 22 at Jackson High School. Doors open at 6:30 p.m. to preview the bedroom scene. The presentation will begin at 7:00 p.m. Students are NOT permitted to attend.


Worms create nutrient-rich soil

Lake Cable students in Mr. Stanley's science class observed composting worms as part of their Nature's Recyclers unit. Worms eat food scraps, which become compost as they pass through the worm's body. This compost can then be used to grow plants. vermicompost, as it is called, is good for plants because nutrient-rich fruit and vegetable scraps become nutrient-rich compost.

While studying how communities change over time, Sauder third grade students visited Jackson Center School (the one room school house located on Fulton Drive, just west of Jackson High School).

Mrs. Mary Aaby, from the Jackson Township Historical Society, gave students a taste of what it was like to be a student long ago. Instead of computers, students used hand-held chalk boards. All grade levels studied together in

one room. The teacher arrived early to warm the school by making a fire in the pot-belly stove. The teacher also acted as custodian, cleaning the school. There were no indoor restrooms and no school buses. Students walked to school or piled into the back of a farmer's pick-up truck for a ride to school.


The one room school is owned and operated by the Jackson Township Historical Society. The society relies on

Jackson seeks to serve children with disabilities

Within the intent of the federal statutes (Rehabilitation Act of 1973-section 504 and Individuals with Disabilities Education Act IDEA-public law 105-17), the Jackson Local School District continues its effort to locate and identify children with disabilities from birth through age 21. Children with disabilities have physical, emotional, and or mental impairments that may require special education. Public schools provide free and appropriate education regardless of a child's disability. However, before these children can be served, they must be found. Many of these children are not visible because they may not function in the community's mainstream, and many are preschoolers. Parents may not realize that programs and services are available through their school district or from agencies in their community. If you are aware of a child who may need a special education program or services, contact the principal of the school the child attends or would likely attend upon reaching school age.

Jackson seeks federal grants for special education

The Jackson Local School District is eligible to submit two applications to the Ohio Department of Education for federal grants to maintain and improve special education programs and services in the Jackson Local Schools: Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA) (Public Law 105-17) and Education of the Handicapped Act, Preschool Grant Program (Public Law 99-457). Residents within the Jackson Local School District may inquire and make program and service recommendations regarding the grant applications. JHS Fall Sports Update

At the time of this printing, Jackson High School fall sports teams were still in active play. However, three teams have already won conference titles: Girls' Golf, Boys' Soccer, and Girls' Volleyball. Here is a recap of the fall sports season so far:

Girls' Golf completed the Federal League season unbeaten and won both the pre-season and post-season Federal League tournaments to take the Federal League overall championship. The Lady Bears were also Sectional champions, District runners-up and finish second in the state at the Division 1 Girls' Golf State Championships. The team has placed among the top three in the state in the past four consecutive years.

Boys' Golf completed the season with a 5-1 regular season league record, finished 4th in both pre and post season League tournaments and 4th overall in the Federal League.

Girls' Tennis completed the season with an overall record of 17-5 and 5-1 in the Federal League. They also finished 2nd in the Federal League tournament to finish 2nd overall in the league and advanced to the Regional semi-finals of the Ohio Coaches' Association Tournament.

Boys' Cross Country finished in 4th place in the Federal League meet and 4th place in the Division 1 NE District meet, qualifying them to the Regional meet for the 4th consecutive season.

Girls' Cross Country finished in 4th place in the Federal League meet and 2nd place in the Division 1 NE District meet, qualifying them to the Regional meet for the 20th consecutive season.

Boys' Soccer currently has a 14-2-2 overall record and finished the League season with a perfect 6-0 record to become Federal League champions.

The Bears won the Sectionals and have advanced to the District championship match.

Girls' Soccer currently has a 13-4-1 overall record and 4-1-1 record in the Federal League to finish 2nd. The Lady Bears won the Sectional tournament and have advanced to the District championship match.

Volleyball currently has a record of 23-3 and finished the Federal League season with a perfect 12-0 record. The Lady Bears are also Sectional and District champions and have qualified for the Division 1 NE Regional tournament for the 4th consecutive year.

Football currently owns a 5-3 overall record and 3-1 record in the League with 2 regular season games remaining. The Bears are currently ranked 15th in Division 1, Region 1. The top 16 teams in each region qualify for the state playoffs.

What in the world we did on our summer vacation

Jackson students are becoming globally proficient.

There were four student cultural exchange trips over the summer. For the fifth year, Jackson staff and families in our community opened their homes for nine summer days to 26 Chinese students and two chaperones from Jiaozhou #1 High School as part of our ongoing effort to help our students become more globally proficient. Prior to their arrival in Jackson, the Chinese students visited Boston (and the campuses of Harvard, MIT, and Yale), New York City, Washington, D.C., Philadelphia, and Arcadia University. While in Jackson, they toured our high school, visited Kelley's Island, attended a cookout and bonfire at Willowdale Lake, and saw the Timken Hall of Fame Grand Parade. In addition, many of the host families treated their guests to local events and attractions such as the Canton Food Tour, an Indians game, Easton Village and Cedar Point to increase their cultural exposure. One Chinese student was featured in the Massillon Independent commenting on how much she liked the food at the Ribs Burn-off.

Eight students (Michael Markoff, John Mickley, Hannah Parish, Sarah Parish, Grace Taylor, Greta Taylor, Christina Grubb, and Samantha Sampson) traveled with their chaperone, JHS Assistant Principal Jeff Kracker to Jiaozhou #1 High School in China for two weeks of similar cultural exchange. They visited Beijing and Xi'an, China's last two remaining ancient cities with over 3,000 years of history, left untouched during the Cultural Revolution,

Four students (Emily Cao, Caleb Ternent, Taylor Rhorig, Ellen Baker) traveled to Beijing and Henan Province, China with JHS teacher Kathryn Stone and a group of 500 students/chaperones from across the USA for a three-week immersion in Mandarin martial arts at the Shaolin Wushu Vocational School.

Seven Jackson students (Cameron Emily, Nic Joy, Emily Rozmajzl, Jonathan McCormick, Lindsey Zinno, Taylor Weirtz, and Vinnie Yacono) spent three weeks in Costa Rica with our sister school families. While there, students zip lined, went to a volcano, white water rafted, went to beaches, spent time in schools, all while immersing themselves in the language and culture. Students from those families have traveled to Jackson, Smithville, and East Canton three times in the past. This was our first trip to visit them. Our tico friends and their teacher, Zulma Clavijo, will return to Jackson on December 26 for three weeks.

And it doesn't stop there. Upcoming trips are planned for Spain, England, and Puerto Rico. In addition, the Jackson Band will perform in China over spring break.
